Noteworthy Accomplishments / Events:

1955: First "Super Carrier"

1963: Conducted trials that included landings and take offs of a Lockheed C-130 (*Hercules*) (BuNo 149798), accomplished 29 Touch and Go landings and 21 full stop landing. This aircraft may be the largest known aircraft to land and take off from a carrier.

1967: After five days on line at Yankee Station in the Gulf of Tonkin, an accidental launch of a missile starts a major fire that killed 132 sailors and injured 62. Ship suffered major damage including seven large holes in the flight deck, fire damage in below deck areas and shrapnel damage to the island. Lessons learned incorporated in training film *Learn or Burn*.

1989: Supported U.S. Diplomats during the Malta Summit between President George Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev. Her assigned air group provided CAP overhead during the summit.

1991: CV-59 selected to replace LEXINGTON (AVT-16) as the Navy's training carrier. Ship reclassified AVT-59 and was under conversion when the Navy decided to decommission her.

Conclusion:

FORRESTAL meets the criteria to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. She is the first of her class and the very first "Super Carrier." All carriers built since owe something to the basic FORRESTAL design.
