### Vessel History

<b>Deployment Summary</b>	PELELIU's deployments included a significant role in the 2001 Operation <i>Swift Freedom</i> in which marines from the 15th and 26th MEUs departed the ship — assigned to Naval Expeditionary Task Force 58 — to take and hold one of the first U.S. footholds in Afghanistan as part of Operation <i>Enduring Freedom</i> . Other deployments included assisting in the evacuation of people from the Philippines following the 1991 eruption of Mt. Pinatubo and aided civilians in following the 1989 San Francisco earthquake. The ship returned to San Diego on Christmas Eve 2014 following her final six-month deployment in the Western Pacific with GERMANTOWN (LSD 42) and the Okinawa-based 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU).
