Noteworthy Events	In 1991, NICHOLAS was serving in the north Persian Gulf as an advance combat search and rescue platform. During the first few weeks of the war, she distinguished herself in action by attacking Iraqi positions off the coast of Kuwait, capturing the first Iraqi prisoners of war, sinking or damaging seven Iraqi patrol boats, destroying eight drifting mines and successfully rescuing downed pilots from the waters off the Kuwaiti coast. She also escorted the battle ships MISSOURI (BB 63) and WISCONSIN (BB 64) during Naval Gunfire Support operations. In 1993, NICHOLAS was supporting U.N security sanctions against the governments of Iraq and the former Republic of Yugoslavia, carrying out more than 170 boarding operations in search of illegal cargo shipments. In 1995, NICHOLAS enforced a naval blockade in the Adriatic, conducting more than 120 boardings and rescued 16 souls from a capsized vessel. In 2002, NICHOLAS received a visit from <i>The Today Show</i> . The purpose for the visit was the promotion of the free book issue, of the book Medal of Honor, to the service members of the United States Navy.

	During both of NICHOLAS' counter drug operations, in 1992 and 2012,
	NICHOLAS confiscated over 16,000 lbs of cocaine, 500 lbs of marijuana
	and detained 14 suspected narcotic smugglers.
	In 2003, NICHOLAS visited St. Petersburg, Russia for a Fourth of July
	celebration, a wreath laying for the 1.5 million people who died in defense
	of the city during World War II and a commemoration of the mutual
	interest in John Paul Jones, considered by some to be the "Father of the
	American Navy." NICHOLAS also, visited Neum, Bosnia, as goodwill
	ambassadors to a country recovering from a lengthy and violent war. She
	was the first warship to visit since 1917 and the first ever from the United
	States.
	Pirates fired on NICHOLAS west of the Seychelles on 1 April 2010. The
	frigate and her embarked SH-60B Seahawk defeated the pirates, sank their
	skiff, and captured their mother ship and five Somali pirates from the two
	vessels. A Federal Jury in Virginia convicted the five to Life+80 years in
	prison (November 2010). Working for an Aviation Task Force was
	challenging but resulted in the first successful pirate prosecution in over
	100 years.
