Arrival also marked the first time a front line US Navy amphibious vessel visited China. 2004/November - Emergency deployed to the Philippines after several typhoons hit the country. While on station, she provided a platform for U.S. Air Force helicopters to bring much-needed fuel into the Philippines. 2005 Indian Ocean Earthquake and Tsunami- Fort McHenry was dispatched to render assistance as part of Operation Unified Assistance alongside other U.S. Naval Ships. 2006/April - Fort McHenry participated in HULLSWAP2006 with USS Tortuga. Fort McHenry departed Sasebo, Japan and arrived Norfolk Naval Station Sept 2006. 2006/July - Fort McHenry arrived in port Baltimore, MD. This event marked the first time the Fort McHenry had visited its namesake, she was greeted with replica cannons from the war of 1812, and gun salute was fired by the forts living history unit, the Fort McHenry Guard. 2009 January - May the ship served as the Flag Ship for the inaugural Africa Partnership Station Deployment. 2010 Earthquake in Haiti, Fort McHenry was member of the Bataan ARG that arrived in Haiti in January 2010 rendering assistance as part of Operation Unified Response.
