Deployment Summary	20 October 1994, Anzio departed Naval Station Norfolk for its maiden Mediterranean deployment in the Adriatic Sea.
	On 23 May 1997, Anzio took part in Exercise BALTOPS '97 in the Baltic Sea., from 16-27 June7, joining 47 other ships from 12 European nations in the Partnership for Peace exercise.
	On 10 June 1998, Anzio departed Norfolk for a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean and Black Seas, as part of the USS Eisenhower (CVN 69) Battle Group.
	On 5 February to 5 March 2000, Anzio conducted Naval Surface Fire Support (NSFS) qualifications off Cape Wrath, Scotland, and participation in a British Royal Navy joint and combined warfare training exercise Joint Maritime Course (JMC) 01.
	On 30 March 2000, Anzio anchored off the coast of Cannes, France, for a three-day visit after participated in exercises Pioneer II and Ample Train. Participated in Experiment Golf, a battle group test of the latest new technology Joint Theater Anti-Missile Defense and targeting systems from 1 -11 April 2000.
	From 21-28 Sept. 2000, Anzio was underway for a series of tests leading to the Cooperative Engagement Capability (CEC) Operational Evaluation (OPEVAL) scheduled for Spring 2001.
	On 21 May 2001, Anzio departed Naval Station Norfolk to participate in the 29th annual maritime exercise Baltic Operations (BALTOPS) 2001.
	On 9 January 2003, Anzio departed Naval Station Norfolk for a Composite Training Unit Exercise (COMPTUEX) as part of the USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71) Battle Group.
	On 23 March 2003, Anzio fired 8 Tomahawk Land Attack Missiles (TLAMs) in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom from the station in the eastern Mediterranean; 4 TLAMs fired on March 27;

On 26 May 26, Anzio arrived in New York City, New York, for a week- long port visit to participate in a Fleet Week festivities.
On 13 October 2003, Anzio departed Naval Station Norfolk to participate in a Royal Navy's Joint Maritime Course (JMC) 04-3 in the northern Atlantic.
On 10 November 2006, Anzio provided assistance to a 35 meter Iranian- flagged dhow "SINAA" from Kubala, Iran, off the coast of Pakistan, while conducting maritime security operations (MSO) in the Arabian Sea.
On 8 January 2007, Anzio conducted Maritime Interdiction Operations (MIO) off the coast of Somalia in an effort to capture al Qaeda terrorists attempting to flee the country.
On 13 February 2007, Anzio came to the rescue of a Pakistan-flagged dhow Al-Sanaullah, in distress in the Arabian Sea.
May 21, The Anzio responded to a distress call on May 20 from Amerauto, a 34-foot sailing vessel. The vessel was slowly sinking and the four crew members were transferred to the cruiser.
From 19 April through 2 May 2008, Anzio transited the Atlantic Ocean to participate in the Joint Warrior 081, a United Kingdom-led multi-national warfare exercise, off the coast of Scotland.
On 3 June 2011, Anzio participated in a multinational exercise Sea Breeze 2011.
On 6 July 2011, Anzio conducted counter-piracy and maritime security operations in the Central Command AoR, as part of the Combined Task Force (CTF) 151.
From January 30 to 12 February 2012, Anzio participated in a joint and multinational amphibious assault exercise Bold Alligator 2012, off the coast of Virginia and North Carolina.
On 3 July 2014, Anzio participated in Independence Day and Old Home Week festivities in Eastport, Maine.
On 25 June 2014, Anzio conducted a Tomahawk Land Attack Missile (TLAM) Operational Test Launch (OTL) off the coast of Florida.
On 12 May 2017, Anzio was inducted into the Navy's guided-missile cruisers Phased Modernization program, following an Induction

	Continuous Maintenance Availability (I-CMAV), during a ceremony on board the ship. On 6 December 2022, Anzio departed Naval Station Norfolk, under tow by offshore tug Gary Chouest, enroute to Naval Inactive Ship Maintenance Facility in Philadelphia, Pa.

Noteworthy Events	 On 23 October 2006, Anzio anchored off the coast of Tivat, Montenegro, for a three-day port call. She is the first U.S. Navy ship to visit Tivat since 1975. On 15 October 2009, Anzio seized 4 tons of hashish with an estimated worth of \$28 million, while on patrol in the Gulf of Aden. On 13 January 2016, Ten U.S. Navy Sailors, assigned to Riverine Squadron (RIVRON) 3, that were captured Tuesday after their two RCBs entered Iranian waters near Farsi Island. They were escorted by Iranian boats to a rendezvous point in the Arabian Gulf and then boarded the Anzio for medical checks. On 22 September 2022, Anzio held a decommissioning ceremony on Naval Station Norfolk, after more than 30 years of active service. On 30 September 2022, Anzio was officially decommissioned and stricken from the U.S. Naval Vessel Register.
