	During RIMPAC 2014, Independence accomplished being the firsts of its class including a San Diego to Hawaii transit without refueling, sustained embarkation and integration of SUM and HSC detachments, simultaneous	

dual helicopter operations, first boarding using organic visit board search and seizure (VBSS) team, first "Real World" tasking, conducted vertical replenishment for stores, carrier plane guard operations, live Hellfire shoot from an LCS Air Asset, integration into Composite Warfare Commander (CWC) operations, Afloat Forward Staging Base Operations with Peruvian and Korean SOF, coordinated Air/Surface Search and Rescue (SAR) Exercise, acted as Opposing Force (OPFOR) against a multinational Surface Action Group (SAG).

In 2015, Independence during the transit through the Panama Canal to Naval Air Station Pensacola for preparations to conduct the initial Operation Test & Evaluation (IOT&E) of the Mine Countermeasure Mission Package for the Independence Class Seaframe.

In 2017, Independence found its crew. LCS crew 201's "SPARTANS" now have a home. As the first single-crewed Independence –Variant ship, the crew (including the merged Mine Detachment 2 "PANTHERS") restored Independence to Operational Readiness and prepared to get back to sea. After several months of Off-Hull training and support of embarked crews, the crew took permanent command of Independence 10 March 2017, relieving LCS crew 203 "Sea Dogs" (USS Coronado Blue) in San Diego, CA.

In 2018, was the year USS Independence went back to sea after being moored for 18 months in prolong maintenance availabilities, Independence made its triumphant return as an Operational Unit. INDY also supported the waterfront and the Navy, providing a platform for training and education with hundreds of individuals participating in tours of the ship and multiple crews completing their certification onboard. Additionally, Independence drove MCM Mission capability development in testing the Knifefish System and UISS, ascertaining MIW feasibility for LCS-2 Variant ship.

In March 2019, Independence participated in a PASEX with the Canadian and Mexican Navy.

In May 2019, Independence supported the USS Montgomery SWATT event and participation in the Portland Rose Festival on short notice.

In June 2019, Independence supported the Royal Canadian Navy Pre-Deployment Advanced Tactical training event deployment. The latter half of 2019 was devoted to read-E 6/7 and INSURV Material Assessment preparations and performance which Independence executed successfully with above fleet average scores.

	In 2020, Independence completed crew resource management and rapid refresh at the LCS Training Facility (LTF). Hosted distinguished leadership from the Japan Maritime Self- Defense Force (JMSDF), accomplished routine local underway, and achieved certification in several mission areas in pursuit of basic phase completion.
